JUSTGRANTS:
NOVEMBER 3, 2025

Who may apply:

State governments, federally recognized Native American tribal governments, and Native American tribal organizations.

Why Apply:

To receive funding to enhance the capacity of regulatory, law enforcement agency, and public health officials to collect and analyze controlled substance prescription data and other scheduled chemical products through a centralized database administered by an authorized agency.

Maximum per award:

- Up to \$2,000,000.

BJA encourages the following entities to apply:

- Agencies that have not previously received BJA funding.

Examples of strategies/ activities that can be funded:

- Provide training for PDMP system users.
- Support collaboration among law enforcement, prosecutors, public health officials, treatment providers, and treatment courts.
- Facilitate and improve the exchange of information and collection of data on prescriptions and other scheduled chemical products among states.
- Develop different methods for collecting PDMP information.
- Address staffing needs for the PDMP agency and support agencies.
- Document the results of the project to share the information with other PDMPs; provide guidance should another PDMP want to replicate the project.

How to apply and when:

Submit a two-step application.

1. Register in [Grants.gov](https://grants.gov) and follow the prompts to submit the SF-424 form by October 27, 2025.
2. Then complete the full application in JustGrants.usdoj.gov by November 3, 2025. The application's major elements are:
 - a. The **proposal abstract** that summarizes the problem you wish to address with your project (no more than 400 words).
 - b. The **proposal narrative** that describes your project's strategies, activities, and major deliverables as well as your capacity to address the problem.
 - c. The **web-based budget** form that details how you will allocate the grant funds by task, date, and responsible person.
